TYPE(LIST), POINTER :: IN_LIST, LIST_COPY => NULL()
TYPE(LIST), POINTER :: IN_WALK, TEMP, PREV_COPY
! Copy IN_LIST to LIST_COPY
IN_WALK => IN_LIST
DO WHILE ( ASSOCIATED(IN_WALK) )
  ALLOCATE ( TEMP )

This copies the list starting at IN_LIST. After copying, each element of the list starting at LIST_COPY has a polymorphic component, ITEM, for which both the value and type are taken from the ITEM component of the corresponding element of the list starting at IN_LIST.
